# Jump in complaints linked to change in people's attitudes

HEALTH: A community more likely to speak up when something goes wrong may be a reason behind a 30 per cent jump in the number of complaints received by the state's health watchdog. The Health and Community Services Complaints Commission 2009-10 annual report, released this month, shows 1090 complaints against health care providers, up from 832 the previous year. HCSCC Commissioner Leena Sudano said the exact reason behind the increase was unknown but could be because of changes in the community's attitude toward voicing complaints.
