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Rundle St revamp

Eleanor Miller asked developer Steve Maras about Rundle St's recent image change.

GEOPD Rundle St has changed in the 15 or so years since it was a student enjoying regular refreshment at the Easter.

I used good old Dan Giovann's, Big Star records, Boongiorno's (the of my first appealing absept at university), and the arty Boltz Cafe.

Once upon a time there was a great underground shop on the northern side of the street.

And I remember opening The Advertiser to see if I'd gotten into trouble. I was in Johnny Rockets, (that tacky 80s-style diner where the waiters spontaneously break tap dance).

This has to be a good thing for Adelaide.

The question is: how and why this has all come about?

The posh retailers

In the past 18 months, despite the

Global Financial Crisis, Rundle St has gained Gripp Jeans (conveniently now in Liquidation curiously), Sass & Blide, SABA, Lisa Ho, Culture Jack London and Zanerabian.

Alcovee HC opened last week in the former Amaranth Thai building and is having its official launch party on June 11.

And there's at least one more high end store to come (being kept anonymously secret).

My understanding is that all of these retailers are as far happy with their trading results, operating at a level as expected or above expectations.

Back to the day Rundle St was a lot grungier, and all about students.

Over time it's become more slick, and there's been a sudden burst of sparkling, decidedly non-grunge high-end fashion boutiques.

In the past 18 months, despite the

Grocy, which bought four blocks of Rundle St from the State Government in 2001 (reaching from the Stag Hotel to Dalton St).

Managing Director Steve Maras says there was a perception at the time that the strip was restaurant-heavy and "a bit stagnant".

Seeking to increase its day-use and profile, he set about attracting high-end boutiques with the assistance of local fashion retail specialist Loo Roads (and a big breach account).

Why go for the high end? Well retailers including Sportsgirl, Brian Rockford and Esprit had already been trialled unsuccessfully on Rundle St in the mid '90s.

It would appear they were too close to what was already on offer in Rundle Mall. Time to try something to set it apart.

By fortunate coincidence, a number of tenancies along Rundle St ended within a short space of each other.

They included the premises of Blue Chilli (a Jewellery shop that has moved to Regent Arcade), Platinum (a fashion shop no longer operating) and Natural (which has consolidated in David Jones).

After much canvassing by Steve and Loo, Gripp Jeans decided to move into one of the newly vacated shop fronts, followed by Sass & Blide.



In a nutshell, like began networking like and the others came onboard in a relatively short time.

"We had a five year plan but it all happened in 18 months we were very surprised by that," Steve says.

The one disappointment so far is that he came very close to securing Scanlan and Theodore but was unable to offer the company a shop floor big enough for its needs.

The nightlife The other thread to this "behind the scenes" story has been a blunt "kill nightclub scene" campaign on Rundle St.

Since becoming landlord, the Maras Group has restricted the hours of the Stag Hotel and the Belgian Beer Cafe.

Backed by surrounding residents, it has actively campaigned against other late night venues on the street in buildings owned by other landlords.

A current bone of contention is a proposed billiard hall proposed for the top of Allesco's.

"We don't want the teeth that are attracted by late nights and bright lights, we want people (as tenants)," Steve says.

"We've had bars and night club operators in the past willing to

offer us double the rent to take on a tenancy. We turn them away."

End product

Steve says the success of the street comes down to "careful planning" and "having the right mix of retailers and cafes so there's something happening day and night".

He knew he'd reached his goal of creating a "lifestyle strip" when the Crown Hotel came to town, specifically asking to be located near Rundle St in the East End.

Rundle St gossip from Steve

LEONARD MILLER is moving further down Rundle Street over the high end boutiques, with a new shop fit out.

Deanne Marden shows will be arriving on the main floor slab of the street in July.

Lo Rundle High will expand to include a third level, specialising in group treatments (particularly targeting home nights).

Con the two blocks of tenancies owned by the Maras group there are 70 landlords (many of which are operators/partners you might run across from the street). They include architects, a Sydney riding company, lawyers, engineers, and recently, artist Nick Xenophon.

Marla Group (ex) Mary Maras says he "will never touch" Mary Maras Bookshop or giftwrap outlet (both), describing both as "Athelstane institutions".

Do the Maras Group plan to build some new premises in "nooks and crannies around the place" on Rundle St.

Marie high-end retailers are welcome on Rundle St. Ebenezer Place (just behind Rundle St) is designed to accommodate youthful independent retailers (the indie crowd).

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
